Answer: "To be quite honest, I haven't given that question very much attention. I am much more concerned with whether we are on God's side."

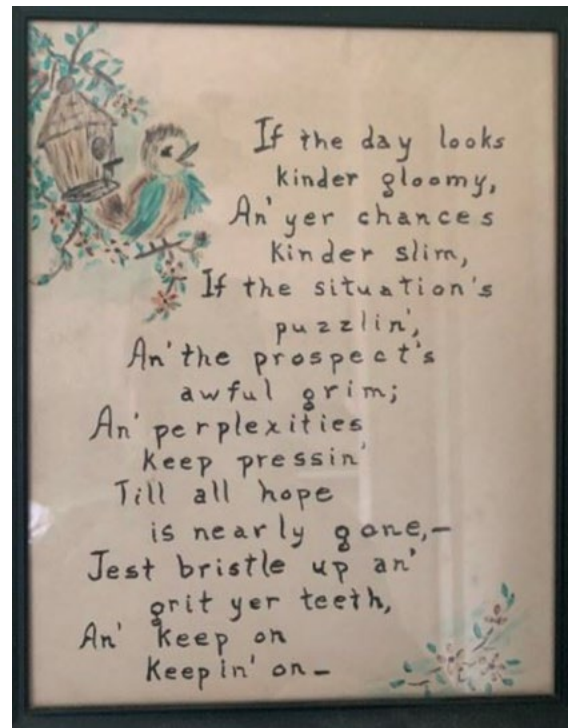

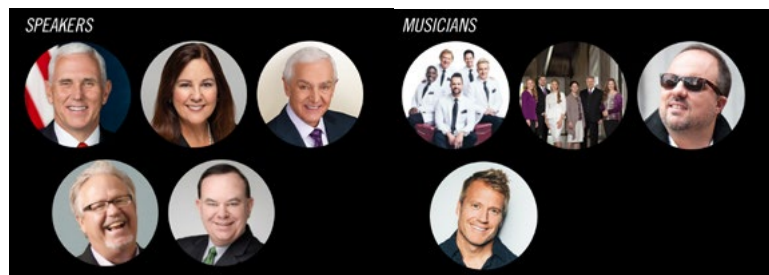

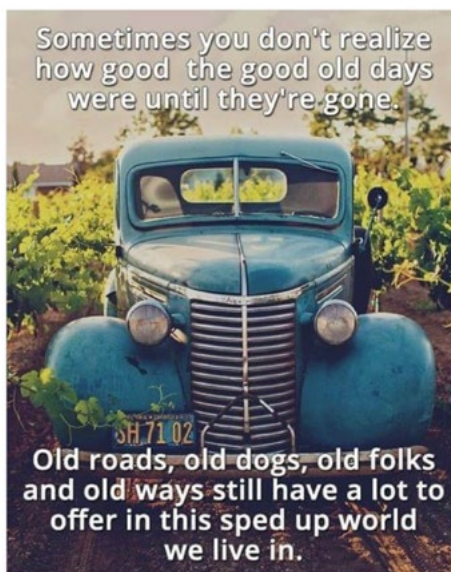

When it comes to our spiritual lives ... we have this huge jigsaw puzzle.

...It does not matter how many pieces there are to your life jigsaw puzzle, and how many people there are that add to your spiritual jigsaw puzzle, there will always be one piece missing. That final piece is the one piece that you will miss the most. If you have ever built a jigsaw puzzle, and after hours or even days of building, you come to the final piece to add to the puzzle, and find that it is not there, it is gone, then that one missing piece will cause you more despair than the rest of all the pieces that you have combined. Teach a youth about the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it. Proverbs 22:6

June is the month of Father's Day. It's hard to believe I lost my Dad to cancer 31 years ago. I still remember him so vividly. He was not a particularly spiritual man, but he was the unquestioned leader of our family. He worked hard every day to provide for us. As was typical of men in his generation, he was not openly emotional or affectionate. Yet he left no doubt that we were loved and cherished.

My Dad was a born leader. He didn't want to be involved in activities unless he could lead them. He was drafted into the Army during World War II and, despite entering as a rank private, quickly ascended to sergeant and led a tank destroyer squad. Upon retirement in Florida, he discovered the shuffleboard courts in his community were overrun with weeds from lack of use. Of course, he removed the debris, then organized and ran a tournament for all residents. I idolized him and wanted to be just like him. His approval meant everything to me.

One of my fondest memories was his attending the conference championship track meet my senior year of high school. I won the 100-yard dash that day. (Yes, I'm so old that track distances were then measured in yards, not meters.) He told me afterward that he was proud of me. I remember how incredible that made me feel. In fact, it still does more than 50 years later.

I am in awe of his influence on me to this day. Besides the physical resemblance, I find myself copying his good and bad. He was quick tempered and impatient. So am I. He also loved to talk, was strong in his convictions, and unafraid to step out front and lead toward something he believed in. I admired those qualities and have tried to emulate them.

It is impossible to overstate the influence a father or grandfather can have on his children and grandchildren. The verse in Proverbs 22 is trying to wake us up to our opportunity to do and say and model Christian values to our loved ones. We are never so old that they stop observing us. They are still paying attention to what you regard as important, and what you dismiss as non-essential. Tell them you love them. Tell them you are proud of them. Tell them Jesus loves them as well. Most importantly, model to them that submission to Jesus' will for their lives is the path to true joy and fulfillment. As the Bible verse says, even when they are old, they will not depart from it.

Which is the Bible's way of saying they will be SAMsational!

Depression, War Impacted FBCT Growth

In her book, *The Steeple Beckons*, Katherine Hale Hanlin says the 1940s and 1950s were accompanied by changes in Trussville faster than in any previous period in history. Inevitably, Trussville Baptist, the town's largest church, wasn't excluded from those changes.

Two major factors encouraged growth. One was the Great Depression, which melted into World War II, the other factor. Both lasted several years, affecting people all over the globe, including those in tiny Trussville.

Among the countless measures designed by the Roosevelt administration to aid Americans during the depression was the Cahaba Project, which later was abbreviated to "the Project" by locals. For years, this term has puzzled potential homebuyers or those moving into the neighborhood. Completed in 1938, the Project included 243 single-family homes and 44 duplexes on spacious lots, rented to qualified wage-earners. Although modest by today's standards, Project homes featured streets, running water and power in homes, a high school, a community building and a co-op store. To some of the Project's new residents, many amenities seemed downright palatial.

Another factor, tied to and following the first, was World War II, which brought veterans home to their families or to establish new ones. Project homes, built as rentals, were put up for sale after the war ended. Many returning veterans bought Project houses and stayed on. In the meantime, the little community of Trussville, just outside the Project, was incorporated as a town in 1947. On May 31, 1957, the town officially became a city.

Although Trussville Baptist Church had several pastors during the 40s, 50s and 60s, two of them – Grover Walker and Richard Francis—left especially strong impressions on generations of churchgoers.

Walker, who had left the business world to attend Southern Baptist Seminary and then pastor churches in Kentucky, arrived in Trussville in 1941, the year the U.S. entered World War II. Trussville church leaders had foreseen the need for a different location, so a building fund was already planned.

"Brother Walker became a source of strength in years of war and uncertainty," Hanlin says in her book. "But even with the war as a focus of concern, the church was growing." By 1945, with the war winding down, plans were re-activated and building began. By November 1946, the new church had opened in its present location.

Gloria Forehand, still active in the church today, walked from her home across the road from the Methodist church to attend many youth activities at Trussville Baptist. Later, the Forehand sons, Stan and twins Dave and Dale, would be involved in similar activities at the church. There were few momentous occasions in their family's lives that didn't involve their church.

"One exception was my baptism," says Gloria. "It took place at Sulphur Springs Baptist Church, because the baptistry in our church was in the process of being built. But when Sherman (Forehand) and I were married in 1956, Sherman's father, minister at another local church, officiated, but the ceremony was at what by then was named First Baptist-Trussville."



A gifted singer and musician, Gloria believes that she holds the record for long-term membership in the First Baptist choir. She also has served at numerous other paid and volunteer jobs during her lifetime at First Baptist. Her service has ranged from teaching third-grade children's choir to being financial secretary and later church treasurer. With a background in real estate sales, she's been on property acquisition committees for many years and also more recently on the building committee.

Grover Walker left Trussville in 1957 but stayed in touch with former members. The FBCT chapel is named in his memory.

Also leaving a strong imprint on FBCT was Rev. Richard E. Francis, who was pastor between 1965 and 1988. A graduate of Howard College and New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, he had previously served at Boyles Baptist Church, Tarrant City. During his time at Boyles he had already become active in state and local denominational causes. Beginning his Trussville ministry in June 1965, the next month he appointed a building fund committee to raise funds for a new sanctuary and educational building, as well as office and choir rehearsal space. The quick action was needed. Trussville's population had reached 2,510, and FBCT's membership was in the 900 range.

Beckie Nash attended another church as a child, but became a member of First Baptist after she and Irving "Chief" Nash married in 1958. Their three daughters, Kim, Kristie and Kellie, all grew up attending FBCT.

"Brother Francis had the reputation of being pretty strict with children," Beckie says. "So I was very embarrassed when he paid a visit one day and Kellie, who was 2 or 3 at the time, misbehaved. He was understanding, reminding me that he had three sons. But he didn't hesitate to publicly call down kids acting up in the church balcony or elsewhere during services. He may have struck fear sometimes, but he was also a good man who never hesitated to visit or help those who needed him."

Beckie has assisted teaching in children's Sunday School and for a senior adult class, and remembers Brother Francis setting a high standard for church adults as well as children. "After completing a leadership training class one time, I had to address the whole congregation about what I learned in the class to improve my service as a Christian," she remembers.

After suffering a severe heart attack in 1983, Brother Francis received a standing ovation when he was able to return to the pulpit. The recovery didn't last long, but long enough for the pastor to form another building committee so that work could begin again. He was to suffer a relapse in 1987 and died in 1988.

On July 22, 1988, the Richard E. Francis Educational Building was dedicated in his memory.
