I DID IT ON ACCIDENT

No doubt, we've all heard that line! Many times, it actually was "on accident," but it is certain that God's creations were "on purpose"! His plan was and still is perfect; no coincidences. You all know I am always making plans, but not one single one has been anywhere near the complete, detailed plans of God.



It is no accident, for instance, that God created trees on the third day, then man on the sixth day. From Genesis 1 to Revelation 22, there's no doubt about the importance of trees and their roots in God's plans. In Revelation 22:16 Jesus reminds us, "For I am the root and the offspring of David, and the bright and morning star."

Ahhh. And now tis the season when we can rest under the canopy of a big ole shade tree. There we can feel a cool breeze as we lean on a sturdy trunk; we hear the song of the birds and rippling of water in a nearby stream; perhaps we'll have a picnic and enjoy the sustenance God provides us. What quiet repose and peace for our souls has God planted for us.

In the August 2023 wildfires, the town of Lahaina on the Hawaiian Island of Maui lost close to 25,000 trees, leaving 300 viable. According to a recent ABC news report, the iconic Lahaina Banyan tree, heavily scorched, just might survive. The tree has quite a substantial place in the history of Lahaina.

This beautiful tree was brought to Maui by missionaries from India 150 years ago on April 24,1873. Since last year's fire some 8 months ago, the tree has been constantly cared for and fed by local arborists who volunteered time and resources to save the tree.

Dennis Swanberg said of banyan trees in his book Planting Shade Trees: Among other fascinating characteristics, this legendary tree puts down aerial prop roots. ... As the branches of a banyan tree grow out from the original trunk, they send new roots straight down from the limb to the ground. Those groundgrabbing roots act as props for an ever-expanding network of branches.

Let me connect the dots. Jesus said in John 15: 3-5 (KJV)

Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you. Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can you, except ye abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me you can do nothing.

"There are two gifts we should give our children; one is roots and the other is wings." Linda Springfield submitted this beautiful reminder. As we strive to provide our children with their physical family tree and ancestry records, may we also plant that shade tree for them that covers them with their spiritual ancestry tree, from Jesus (the roots) to the day we ourselves became a member of His family. Like the banyan tree, they'll need those roots to spread their wings.

Ernie Andrus of Los Angeles recently participated in a 200 mile overnight run. He is 89 years old.

To folks like me, who have been known to pull a muscle just sitting up in bed or reaching for the TV remote, those accomplishments seem other worldly. And perhaps they are. But they are extreme examples of what we seasoned adults can do if we push ourselves a bit. At my gym there are always a few elder gentlemen working the equipment furiously. Despite hovering around 80 years of age, they can show off clearly defined bicep and chest muscles. They have six-pack stomachs that make me green with envy. When I ask them for their secret, they always say "just don't ever stop. Keep challenging yourself."

As we get older, retire, and get accustomed to enjoying the good life, it's easy to stop challenging ourselves. I'm not just talking about athletics. Sometimes we decline to put forth the effort to stay sharp mentally, to become involved socially, and to be active in executing our Christian walk. In the twelfth chapter of the book of Hebrews, the author writes "Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us".

Sometimes I just feel too tired and weary to run the race. Sometimes I feel like the world is going to seed and there's nothing I can do about it. Sometimes I find myself profoundly disappointed in human beings. I've raised my kids. Worked hard over many decades to earn my retirement. It's time to shift into coasting mode. Relax a while. Let the world come to me for a change. Do you ever feel like that? Like it's just getting too hard to continue to actively seek out God's will for your life and execute it? Like there's too much adversity, too many hurdles and barriers to overcome? Maybe it would be helpful to take note of Galatians 2:2, which says "I presented to them the gospel that I preach among the Gentiles. I wanted to be sure I was not running and had not been running my race in vain."

That's really the heart of it right there. Turns out the challenge is the reward. The task gives us purpose. The effort supplies some sort of meaning to our existence. To just coast through the remaining days God provides for you without an active Christian walk is to "run your race in vain." God is not finished with us. You are still here for a purpose.

So pray hard, worship hard, and keep searching for ways to serve God's kingdom. We may not be able to enter bodybuilding competitions anymore, but we can certainly do our part to strengthen the body of Christ.



What is Missions?






Missions – the vocation or calling of a religious organization, especially a Christian one, to go out into the world and spread its faith.

A total Solar Eclipse will take place on Monday, April 8, 2024, visible across North America and dubbed the Great North American Eclipse. "A total solar eclipse occurs when the Moon's apparent diameter is larger than the Sun's, blocking all direct sunlight, turning day into darkness." The four minute total eclipse will appear near the Mexican town of Nazas, Durango; only a partial eclipse will be visible in other areas in Canada, United States and Mexico. There will not be another total eclipse visible in the contiguous U.S. until August 23, 2044.

AN OVERVIEW OF KNOW WEEKEND By Richard Bailey.

KNOW Weekend was a five-part class on March 2nd and 3rd. The featured keynote speaker and teacher was Dr. Jamie Dew, President of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. Dr. Dew addressed many issues facing Christianity today with the overarching goals: TO STRENGTHEN AND TO DEFEND! Following is an overview of what was covered. A detailed study guide is available that will be helpful to anyone reviewing the material, regardless of whether you attended the conference. NOTE: We covered the modules in the following order: Module 4,2,1,5, and it is strongly recommended that you follow suit if you did not attend the conference!

Module 1, Life After Death

Christianity affirms that we survive our death, but it is a complex and challenging concept. Atheists dismiss resurrection and life after death as wishful thinking and a coping mechanism. How do you explain something that no one has experienced in modern times?

Module 2, The Existence of God

Do we have a model that explains God's existence? Dr. Dew discusses various arguments and models that support the premise of God's existence and the role of a divine being in the creation of the universe.

Module 3, Deity and Sufficiency of Christ

Dr. Dew delivered the Sunday morning sermon and discussed questions faced by Christians and non-believers throughout life.

Module 4, The Relevancy of Christ

Dr. Dew discusses the Bible's impact on issues we face today, just as it was pertinent to the matters faced by our parents', grandparents', etc. generation.

The concept of "God of the Gaps" (refers to the time in the past when there was a tendency to simply plug God in for anything that we could not explain) was discussed. As science progressed, that concept changed; God seemed less and less relevant. The long-term impacts of that worldview were discussed.

We delved into how the Bible satisfies our deepest longings.

Finally, Christianity provides a logical order and foundation for science.

Module 5, Problem of Evil

This is a review of theodicies (defenses of God's goodness and omnipotence during times of evil) and how they compare to the Bible narrative.

Also, how to minister to those who are suffering. Weep with those who weep, be in the moment (probably the most crucial subject matter of the entire seminar).

The Next Step – Final Observations and the Way Forward

Many people attended KNOW Weekend, representing a cross-section of FBCT. There were the well-seasoned, the mid-lifers, the young families, and the students. A wide variety of people with different needs but asking the same question at the end of the day: What now, and how do I apply all of this stuff?

I have struggled with writing this review over the past few days as witnessed by numerous revisions. Applying this information is deeply personal and complex, sometimes beyond my grasp. Eventually, what cracked the code for me was to step back and look at this information and how it impacts me and the others surrounding

me. I reminded myself of when I have been most effective. It was not just what I knew but the connection with others, be it family, friends, acquaintances, etc. Within that paradigm, my focus gravitates to Module 4 because it addresses relevant issues within my family and explores the larger issue of why many are turning their back on religion and becoming "Noners" (people who check the box marked "None" when asked what religion they are). There are other modules I find interesting and will probably explore in the future, but this one best addresses the socialization, or lack thereof, of Christianity.

AFFECTED BY DEMENTIA? YOU ARE **NOT ALONE** By Judy Bryant.

On Tuesday, March 19, our SAM Leadership Team and others had an opportunity to join 190 attendees at a Lunch & Learn event held at Vestavia Hills Methodist Church. This event, and others being held in our area just like this one, are designed to offer helpful information to those who are affected by dementia, whether a caregiver or other support person. We had the opportunity to meet and fellowship with caregivers, support groups from other churches, and indeed even some folks in the beginning stages of dementia themselves.

The conference speaker, Natali Edmonds, board-certified Geropsychologist and Founder of Dementia Careblazers, highly qualified, spoke from experience, and she was excellent. Her own mother, and now her father, have faced dementia and its effects.

Many questions were addressed.

Is it too early for me to be concerned about myself or my loved one as we fear an onset of dementia and where can I get helpful information?

Are there support groups available for the caregiver, as well as the loved one with dementia?

Where can I find assistance as a caregiver with supplies, medicines, special needed equipment, and the like?

What is an appropriate response to certain times that leave both I and my loved one frustrated?

Who can I call?

These and many other questions were addressed. The one thing our speaker asked us all to remember: YOU ARE NOT ALONE. She shared some real, practical, doable suggestions for both the patient and the caregiver. Learn more about Natali and her work in the area of dementia at www.careblazers.com
