
He inspired the writing of His Holy Word, our Bible, our history and our glimpse into the future, and our everyday guidebook. He teaches us.

(excerpts from the last segment of Meyers' comments)


If there has ever been a time to pray for the peace of Jerusalem, this is the time.

Thousands of people on both sides of the conflict have lost their lives. Most of these people are lost; no matter what side they are on, these are lost souls. Pray that maybe war will finally open their eyes to their blindness of Jesus.

Pray for the missionaries who are in the field, on both sides, taking advantage of one last day possibly to share the Gospel. Pray for those Jewish people who are believers in Jesus (Messianic Jews) in the midst of the darkness of war.

Pray that the Gospel would go forward in spite of war and that men and women and boys and girls on both sides would come to know Jesus as their personal savior in spite of a land being shredded by war.

Pray for peace. Not just a military peace. Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Pray for the Romans 5:1 peace. Pray that the loss of life would be minimized on both sides.


I was taken aback as I realized the connection among the three of us and I opened up to tell of my own

REMEMBERING SANDRA BEARDEN

My friend, former neighbor, and fellow writer Sandra Bearden passed away on September 25 after a short illness. Even though she had grown increasingly frail over the past few years, I had always considered Sandra a tough little cookie. So the news that she had left us took me somewhat by surprise.

I had not spent much time with her in a while, and another writer friend and I were looking forward to taking her a meal and enjoying a visit when she got home from the hospital. It turned out to be one of those hard lessons in not putting things off.

Sandra and I became friends through our mutual love of reading and writing. We were both members of the Friends of the Trussville Library and Alabama Media Professionals. We often attended the same meetings and served on the same committees together.

The two of us became co-authors in 2013 when we teamed up on a Trussville pictorial history book. With all the research and photo-collecting, not to mention the writing, the project took a lot of effort, but it was a great learning experience for both of us, and we were pleased with the results.

Early on, though, I learned that friendship with Sandra could be risky. Back then, she drove a humongous green car. I can't remember what kind it was – and I may not even be recalling the color correctly – but it was definitely big. When she offered me a ride to a writers' meeting in Pelham, I happily accepted. But a few miles down the road, I realized we had a problem. Sandra could hardly see over the steering wheel of that barge-like automobile and was largely guessing which lane was hers and which wasn't. My hair was standing on end by the time we got to our destination, and the thought of having to get back into that car for the return trip nearly made me ill. But despite a few bumps in the road – literally – we made it home in one piece.

Despite that one harrowing instance, however, I was privileged to know Sandra and will miss her quiet ways, giving nature, and the example she set for me as a writer and a friend. And knowing that she was a faithful believer and servant of God, I look forward to seeing her in Heaven one day.

But just in case God plans on sending Sandra to pick me up at the Pearly Gates, I'll be praying that her golden chariot isn't a green car.



Sandra Bearden was predeceased by her husband of 51 years, William "Bill" Bearden Jr. She is survived by daughter Ann Sutton, son-in-law Keith Sutton, granddaughters Jordan Sutton and Evan Sutton Carter, and grandson-in-law Matt Carter.

She earned her undergraduate degree and a master's degree with honors from the University of Alabama. After working as a writer for the Birmingham Post-Herald, she worked as a college professor at Samford University, as an editor at South Central Bell, and as a freelance writer.

An avid reader and writer, Sandra frequently volunteered at the Trussville Public Library as a member of the Friends of the Library group. She also enjoyed traveling.

Sandra was a member of First Baptist Church Trussville, where she faithfully served as church clerk and taught Sunday School for many years. Sandra was a constant contributor to our SAM Newsletter. In fact, the entire year prior to our 200th Anniversary Celebration she wrote a piece of our church's history each month for the Newsletter. The family suggested that donations in Sandra's memory be made to the church.


"We are all very grateful and feel very blessed to have been able to share the faithful love of God through music and testimony."
