SAMers were treated to another amazing talent at our August 24 Monthly Luncheon. Shannon Smith claims Colossians 3:16 as he begins his performances. His family picture gives some clue as to why he refers to himself as self-proclaimed "vertically challenged" at 5"7". Don't let that fool you; he has a remarkable voice! He is most recently retired lead singer for the group Three Bridges, but also shared with us that in the 1960s he was lead singer in the top Christian group The Imperials (even sang backup with Elvis a few times)!



In addition to that voice, Smith has a sense of humor. Just ask Barbara Patton to tell you his dog at the bar joke!

At one point in his performance, Smith was joined by Pinson native Jeremie Hudson, who Smith referred to as "my brother from another mother." This talented duo has been singing together in different groups for 19 years.

Smith has had training in opera. He shined in his Italian rendition of "Nessun Dorma." He said he noticed that Derrell Morrison (at the table in front of the stage) sang along (quietly) every word. This song is an aria from Puccini's opera Turandot. The song brought to our memories our own choir and four tenors singing in 2019 Christ is Born (Nessun Dorma, English version).

The longest song, and one Smith says he does not sing in concert often (because of its length), came straight from his soul and has held me captive ever since he introduced it to us. Smith recorded "In the Early Morning" in the 1990s, and it is on his usb album He Has Something to Say. One of his former voice coaches wrote the song for a musical he was writing that was unfortunately never published, as far as we know. The music as Smith so passionately sang it, and the words written so profoundly, draws me into the place where Jesus went in holy communion with our Father.

Smith ended his program with God, Bless America. Well done!

There are three SAMers we recognize as having perfect, or near perfect, "attendance" serving on our Men on Mission construction trips since 1983, the first year FBCT became involved in the annual trips.

Bob Wood, who now heads the Men on Mission group, and George Peoples, who just this last December was recognized as Deacon Emeritus at FBCT, have missed very few of the 39 trips and have been strong, faithful workers and advocates for this ministry.

Bobby Page is at 100%; he's made every one of the 39 trips! In the 2023 MOM Yearbook, Bobby wrote: "As a professional builder, I was asked to oversee the construction activities of the Men on Mission that began in 1983 with 35 men. This was the first major leadership role I had taken in the church, and I realized through my God-given talents in construction I did have something to offer God in the realm of service. I also have repeatedly witnessed that everyone has some talent or ability that they can use in service to God. These spiritual gifts may not be teaching a Sunday school class or singing in the choir, but there is a place for everyone to serve."

This ministry is not only about serving God's churches on construction projects all over the US, but it is also about friends old and new connecting as they work side-by-side. That connection includes many of our young men and boys, learning and working alongside fathers, mentors and friends.



Men on Mission is about serving each other as well. What a great photographer we have in Ron Burkett, helping to memorialize these trips; and the group of men who cook the meals ... Wow!

On the construction project daily devotions are shared, and prayer together is a strength builder for each of the workers.

Why do these men give their time, energy and resources each year on these trips? They will tell you, "Because it is All About Him!" Colossians 3:23 And whatsoever ye do, do it heartily, as to the Lord, and not unto men.








WMU BUSY AS BEES 2023

These are only highlights..... our WMU ladies are ALWAYS busy. They are smart shoppers and look for bargains so they can help more people with the

money that is donated. They really are the hands and feet of Jesus.

Thank you to our leader, Shirley Lyle; to each of the ladies who serve; and to each and every one of YOU who contribute needed items and funds throughout the year!



January: Collected over 200 pairs of shoes, socks and underwear and sent to children in Blaine, KY; took blankets to TEAM; made and delivered 5 Sunshine baskets and collected several boxes of school supplies to share with a second grade class at Central Park Elementary.

February: Assembled and delivered 70 hygiene kits to Serving You Ministries; collected over \$1,200 in gift cards for the Miller House at Big Oak Ranch; made and delivered 10 Sunshine baskets.

March: Assembled 50 washcloth and soap bags to be used in hygiene kits and 40 make-up/hygiene kits for teen girls Christmas backpacks; made and delivered 3 Sunshine baskets.

April: Furnished, prepared and served the Holy Week meal at Trussville Methodist Church with 165-180 in attendance; donated to Positive Choices: 2 boxes of new clothes and shoes, 35 packs of baby wipes, 50 mini-hygiene kits, and a \$100 car seat.

May: General meeting where they assembled 50 special hygiene kits for Robison Youth Revival in Tarrant; furnished snacks for VBS group from our church going to Mississippi; collected and sent over 115 pairs of new shoes to Mississippi/Brother Joe Young; delivered 2 Sunshine baskets.

HOW TO BE SATIONAL! SALVED WITH KEN LASS

It's nearly impossible for me to watch my favorite team play football without having some sort of issue somewhere along the way with the officiating. It's either "How could he miss that call?" or "How in the world could he make that call?" No matter what they decide, if it goes against my team, the officials are obviously incompetent or have been paid off to throw the game.

The job of the official has been made even more open to criticism since the advent of instant replay. Slow motion cameras everywhere, endlessly measuring frame-by-frame whether the player's foot was in bounds, or whether he had possession of the ball, or whether he has crossed the goal line. Yet the official has but a split second to make the same decision in real time.

Decisions that are subjective, such as personal fouls, are not reviewable by replay. The official's call stands, regardless. This can be even more frustrating for fans, who know there is no recourse if the judgment goes against their beloved players. This may cause them to vent even more venom toward the rule enforcers.

As a young man, I did some low level officiating, and I can tell you, it's a thankless job. No matter what you decide, somebody will be unhappy. You simply can't please everybody. Yet you must make a decision. There were times when I knew I had gotten the call correct, but the players and their supporters were still brutally critical. Eventually, I concluded I didn't have the stomach for it, and I abandoned officiating.

What the folks in the striped shirts go through on the field is a little bit like trying to live a Christian life in a world growing increasingly secular. There are times when there is a moral decision to make, and we know if we make the right one, it won't fit with current cultural trends. We'll be ridiculed and called prudish, old fashioned, holier than thou, arrogant, condescending. We know we've made the right call, the godly choice, but the result is criticism, not praise.

A football official has to have a strong sense that justice has been properly observed by his decision, even if nobody in the stadium or on television seems to acknowledge it. As Christians, we must have a strong sense that God's will for our lives has been served when we go against the flow of popular thought to continue to live according to biblical principles.

Fortunately, God's word is full of such encouragement. In the 31st chapter of Deuteronomy, God says "be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the Lord your God goes with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you." First Corinthians 16:13 states "Be on your guard; stand firm in the faith; be courageous; be strong." In Philippians 1:20 Paul writes "I eagerly expect and hope that I will in no way be ashamed, but will have sufficient courage so that now as always Christ will be exalted in my body, whether by life or by death."

So the next time you are tempted to stand up in your living room and throw a pillow at the football official on the TV screen, remember he is just trying to summon up the courage to do what he thinks is right. Give him some good ole Christian mercy and forgiveness.

Unless of course, his decision costs your team the game. In that case, he is obviously a bum.

MAY I HAVE A WORD WITH YOU...

"homily" (hom•i•ly): a religious discourse that is intended primarily for spiritual edification rather than doctrinal instruction.

The perfect example of a homily was a talk / speech given by Dr. Gary Fenton at a recent fundraiser luncheon held by the Legacy League. The program listed Dr. Fenton as bringing the Homily. At the podium, the first thing he said, "So, you are asking, what is a homily?!" His definition: a short sermon. A homily is a talk or speech given by a religious figure, not necessarily to a congregation in church, sometimes more casual. The talk is usually based on a certain scripture.

Dr. Fenton's title was "Do I Have to Grow Up?" His answer: Yes and No. Yes, we must respect and handle our adult responsibilities. But also, look what Jesus says in Matthew 19:14.

Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." In other words, we must also guard our hearts and minds not to become hard, but protect our childlike faith and humility before God. See also Matthew 18:3-4.
